I hope your families and congregations are well. We have been busy around here. You may already know that as you've answered our call and have donated a home-cooked meal or housing supplies, or you may have seen me at your Sunday service asking for help! I can't tell you how exciting it has been to have an opportunity to engage in the community and with all of you. I look forward to the opportunity to visit and strengthen our relationships this year!

We have added two new churches to our network in Lapeer County and will continue to reach out to new churches and organizations to help us in our mission. Nicole likes to remind me, "Many hands make light work." Though she didn't coin the phrase, it is true, and we are blessed with each new congregation we add. Though all of this seems great, and it is, the problem is that giving more help means there is more need out there. The number of families and children suffering from housing crises and food insecurity is growing. We already know that roughly 3 million kids are suffering through homelessness in the U.S. Unfortunately, Covid has only increased this number, and the gap in affordable housing also continues to widen. Here at FPGC, we have witnessed the growing number of working twoparent households unable to find housing, pay rent, or afford their essential needs.

Families who have been independent and stably housed and have not needed us for years have been calling for help with essential items. With gas prices and inflation on the rise, it looks like we are in for a busy summer.

Family Spotlight

Helping families look a little different than before COVID. Our new normal focuses on Prevention, Shelter Diversion, and most importantly, Stabilization.

You may not know this, but we are still the only agency in the community helping families with diversion (much less expensive). In addition, CERA funding ended on June 15th, providing eviction prevention; as such, we expect it will be impactful to our organization and families on the edge of month, answering all incoming calls homelessness.

Families are more likely to experience tance. homelessness mid-year than any other time. Many of you have heard us tell the story often, that we hear, "if it weren't for you (Family Promise), I wouldn't be able to pay my rent." We are apprehensive about what the doldrums of summer have in store and are prepared for it to be a busy

Right now, Abby, our Case Manager, works with 15-30 families each and electronic applications for assis-

Each month the number of families Abby speaks with has been averaging 45-50 families, almost all of whom are requesting help. Somehow she does this and stays in contact with the families receiving support, along with our graduates. If you have a couple of hours each month that you might like to give to us-we could use your support delivering meals or making phone calls to check in with families helping talk to families in need.

Family A Story—Father and Son

Stabilization looks different for each family. Some families get back on their feet immediately; some need our support longer.

When it comes to Veterans, we all have a very soft spot for them; this family is no different. This father and son duo have just each other as their extended family (including mom) live out of the country.

We are grateful to our long-time partnership with St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Barb Manor (Coordinator), and the volunteers there are gifting \$500 to a Veteran family.

How we are using it. Our father and son team are be-

hind on their rent because of a non-working vehicle, still one of the number one reasons for family homelessness. What's worse is that it is not working over a minimal amount (\$50).

Abby has identified a shop that will repair the vehicle guickly and inexpensively and use the remaining funds to pay this month's rent. Then with a working car, she will ensure he gets a job so he can pay rent next month.

This is an excellent example of our Graduate and Stabilization Program. At times, the programs overlap but do exactly what they are designed to do-keep families stably housed.

Family B Story— Grandmother and granddaughter.

Sometimes we help families not because they are experi-

encing a housing crisis; we help because it is the right thing to do. For example, we have a Grandmother who has full legal custody of her special needs granddaughter. The granddaughter is twelve; she has cerebral palsy and autism and is cognitively impaired.

Grandma is on oxygen, and carrying the tank around in a multi-level home is very

challenging, to say the least. Before Grandma was awarded custody of her granddaughter, she was already retired

on disability. As you can imagine, she has full hands caring for her granddaughter.

> Enter Family Promise. Currently, Abby is helping them search for a more suitable home that is more affordable for them on a limited fixed income. We are, of course, helping with meals and other household supplies not provided via government assistance.

This is another example of how your volunteer efforts are being utilized as we move forward with the growth of our Stabilization programs.

Did you know that families are more likely to be homeless in the summer than in the winter? Seems odd, right?

Well, it happens for a couple of reasons.

First, if they have been living with another family, as it heats up outside, it can 'heat up' inside too, causing more friction and strife.

Second, families who have been generously housing an additional family don't feel as bad putting parents with kids "out" when the weather is warmer.

Hopefully, you have had a chance to work or talk with Abigail (Abby) by now. I can not begin to tell you how fantastic it is to have someone of her caliber in the case manager role. She has been a blessing to FPGC. Her ability to connect with families and help them reach their full potential has been amazing to watch. I have witnessed her persuade landlords to allow families to stav in one house while we work to find them housing to avoid homelessness altogether. This quick out-the-box thinking has allowed us to help even more families in multiple counties for less cost per family.

We are committed to keeping our families where they belong, in their homes.

Even though we are not rotating families through our emergency shelter, we are still hard at work. We were recently approached by Cheryl Zapfe, the GISD McKinney Vento



Program Specialist for Genesee and Lapeer County, to head up working with doubled-up families in both school districts.

You may remember that HUD does not count doubled-up families as homeless, even though many times those families are likely borrowing a sofa or extra bedroom because they have nowhere else to live.

Currently, in Genesee County,

there are 291 doubled-up families. At the same time as this partnership, we were granted an Expansion Grant from Family Promise National that will help facilitate our growth in Lapeer County.

Our new church

partnerships are located in the city of Lapeer and include Grace Epis-

copal, Lapeer Presbyterian, and Community of Christ. They have graciously accommodated some space for offices for us and Tiffani has
